Introduction

The Loveland Parks and Recreation
Foundation was established in 1983, as
a non-profit organizations to foster and
encourage the advancement of parks and
recreation opportunities in Loveland.
A nine-member board of citizens governs
the Foundation and manages the
activities of the organization.
Fund raising is the Foundation's primary
function. The Foundation provides a means
for concerned and interested citizens to
make donations in support of the services,
programs and facilities of the Loveland
Parks and Recreation Department.



Loveland's *Tee Off for Kids Golf*Tournament and Arts & Crafts Festival served as fundraising opportunities in 2016. The Foundation focused its spending on the youth recreational scholarship program, managing donations, accepting and applying for grants on behalf of the Parks & Recreation Department, and purchasing additional recreational equipment. The Foundation once again served as a mechanism to expand taxpayer dollars and serve the recreational needs of the community.

Youth Recreational Scholarship Program

As part of the Foundation's commitment to the youth of the community, the Youth Scholarship program was continued in 2016. The Program provided recreational opportunities to children and families who may not have otherwise been able to participate in programs due to financial limitations.

In its twenty-sixth year, the scholarship aided 203 children in 20 program areas, totalling \$9,984 in resources to families. Referrals were received from schools. social service agencies, and recreation coordinators. The Foundation also kicked off its first year of the Bucks For Busses program which provides funding for schools to transport students to environmental education programs in the Loveland community. In 2016, the Bucks for Busses program provided funding for 120 elementary school students to attend Environmental Education classes held at the Loveland Public Library and at River's Edge Natural Area.

To help more youth to participate, the Foundation received a \$2,000 grant from the OtterCares Foundation and \$1,250 in grants from WalMart in 2016. The scholarship program is a unique local resource for assisting youth in recreation program participation.

Donations

During 2016, the Foundation administered \$22,177 in memorial and tree planting donations. Because the Foundation is a non-profit 501-3(c) organization, it serves as a mechanism for receiving donations on behalf of the Parks and Recreation Department.
