A meeting of the Loveland Historic Preservation Commission was held Monday, January 15, 2018 at 6:00 P.M. in the City Council Chambers 500 East 3rd Street, Loveland, CO. Historic Preservation Commissioners in attendance were Zach Askeland, Jim Cox, Josh McCarn, Jon-Mark Patterson, Stacey Kersley, Josh McCarn, Paula Sutton and Laurie White. Nikki Garshelis of Development Services was also present.

CALL TO ORDER

Commission Chair Patterson called the meeting to order at 6:10 p.m.

APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

Commissioner Cox made a motion to approve the agenda. Commissioner Sutton seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

CITY COUNCIL UPDATE

STAFF UPDATE

Nikki Garshelis reported that the Kelley-Coffman House was approved by City Council on first reading and is scheduled for second reading at the Tuesday January 16 meeting. She also reviewed the upcoming Boards & Commissions Appreciation event and requested for RSVPs from the Commissioners. There was a discussion about the HPC table requirements.

CONSIDERATION OF NEW BUSINESS

BIKE MONTH-HISTORIC BIKE TOUR

Katie Guthrie, Principal City Planner, Public Works Department, provided information about activities in the planning stage for "June is Bike Month". She reported that in addition to Bike to Work Day and two Bike Art Tours the additional activity will be a Bike History & Architecture Tour. The dates are unconfirmed, she said, but they are looking at June 9, June 16 and June 23 for the Art and History tours. There was a discussion about the tour map for the historic buildings and some of the HPC members agreed they would like to participate. The next meeting for the Bike Month activities is scheduled for January 25 at 2:00pm at the Public Works Building.

COUNCIL OUTREACH AND EDUCATION

Commissioners reviewed a past power point presentation on the historic preservation program and made comments about a few changes to it. Nikki Garshelis will make those changes and re-send it to the HPC. The Commissioners decided they would like to do another presentation at a study session to Council, if possible in April. Nikki will look into scheduling it for them.

GREAT WESTERN RAIL DEPOT

Commissioner Sutton reviewed the recent history of the GWRD. On December 15, 2018 Rod Wensing, Deputy City Manager, sent an email update that the City would be hiring an architect to assess the feasibility of utilizing the Depot and Freight Building in the design of the new Transit Center. He would be scheduling another meeting with the Loveland Historical Society and HPC stakeholders once the architect was hired and plans were assessed. Sharon Danhauer expressed concerns that she had heard that a City Engineer reported that the GWRD would not be moved due to it being too fragile and had suffered too much deterioration. A discussion resulted about having a structural engineer evaluate the buildings. Danhauer reported that previously a mover confirmed that the buildings could be moved. The Commission directed staff to check to see if anything had changed since Rod Wensing's December email.

FIRST NATIONAL BANK ALTERATION

Commissioner Cox reviewed his past concerns about the variation given to the First National Bank building's rooftop addition. Nikki Garshelis reported that she spoke to Heather Peterson at History Colorado who requested pictures of the addition after its completion. She said the state staff will review the pictures and send a written report back.

EDUCATIONAL MATERIALS

- *Commission McCarn and Sutton* discussed the idea of creating some type of educational materials to supply to local restaurants that may be specific for the building they occupy. Commissioner White said that she would like to be involved in the project. Nikki said she would forward historical information about some of the properties discussed and members could mock up some materials to bring to a future meeting.
- *Build Your Own Historic Building:* *Commission Askeland* presented his project of the Pulliam Community building, the Chamber building, Fairground's Bridge and the Power Building along with the instructions to print the buildings on cardstock and create your own model. The commissioners agreed this was an excellent educational tool and Commissioner Askeland said he will create the Lone Tree School House to submit to the Loveland Museum for the possibility in using it at 2nd Grade History Days.
- *Fairgrounds Park Bridge:* Commissioner Askeland reviewed the plaque types presented and suggested a plaque that could be welded to the bridge might be more favorable and less likely to be vandalized or removed. Nikki will bring more plaque examples to the February meeting.
- *Materials for March 8th Boards & Commissions event:* Commissioners discussed how they would like their table set up at the event and reminded everyone to bring their new business cards.

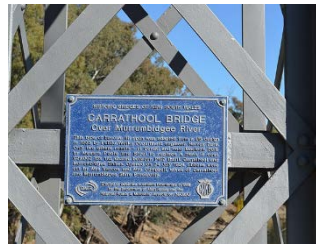
Kelly-Coffman House: The local Historic Landmark Property Designation of Kelly-Coffman House (Cape Cod) at 1410 N. Garfield Avenue was approved on first and second reading by City Council. A landmark plaque was delivered to Shirley Coffman and Tom Pitts. Tom Pitts is looking into applying to the state and national registers.

Fairgrounds Bridge Plaque:



Approx 18" X 12 " Cost estimate \$200/Aluminum (Shipping not included). Larger can range from \$400 to \$1,000 depending upon the text.



Possible plaque text:

Fairgrounds Bridge was constructed in 1915 over the Big Thompson River at First Street. It is 98 feet long, 15 feet wide and medium-span steel, rigid-connected on concrete piers and features a timber plank deck. The bridge exhibits the distinctive characteristics of a Pratt Truss bridge. Patented in 1844 by Caleb and Thomas Pratt, the Pratt structure had become the most popular bridge type in America by the late 19th century. The bridge's superstructure was constructed by Omaha Steel Works, and completed by G.E. Washburn of the Lowith Iron Works. It is the oldest Pratt through truss in Colorado which is still capable of carrying vehicular traffic. The bridge has weathered major floods of the Big Thompson River. In 1970 it was relocated to its present location.

Great Western Railway Depot & Freight Building: February 13, 2018, Michael Hogan, Facilities Manager, reported that they are in the middle of contracting with an architect. Once the architect's contract is complete, a structural engineer will be brought in to assess the GWRD structures.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Loveland Historic Preservation Commission

February 19, 2018

The term of office for the chairperson and the vice chairperson shall be 1 year. Each officer shall be eligible for reelection. However, chairpersons are encouraged not to serve for more than 2 consecutive years so that other board or commission members may gain experience as a chairperson. Officers shall be elected at the next regular meeting following the month of the year in which the terms of office of the members of the board expire or upon resignation of a member serving as Chairperson. *The term of office for this year's elected chairperson and vice chairperson shall expire February 2018.*

1. The current Chairperson shall precede the election and shall do so by making note that the election is taking place.
2. Any member of the Commission may nominate any other member of the Commission to the position of Chairperson or Vice Chairperson. It has been the tradition of the commission to nominate the Vice Chairperson to the Chairperson position.)
3. A main motion is made (*"I move to elect as Chairperson of the Historic Preservation Commission..."*).
4. A second is made to the motion.
5. The motion is discussed.
6. Upon conclusion of the discussion, and if the elected member willingly agrees to the terms of office, the main motion is voted upon.
7. The Vice Chairperson is elected in the same fashion.

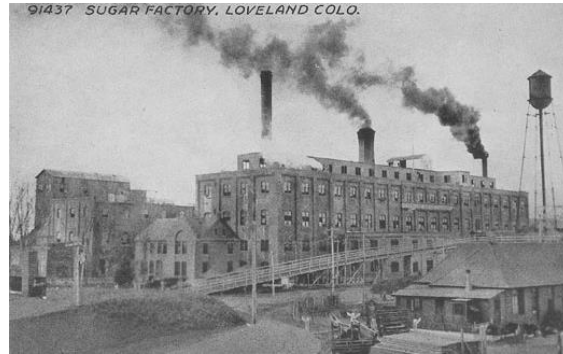

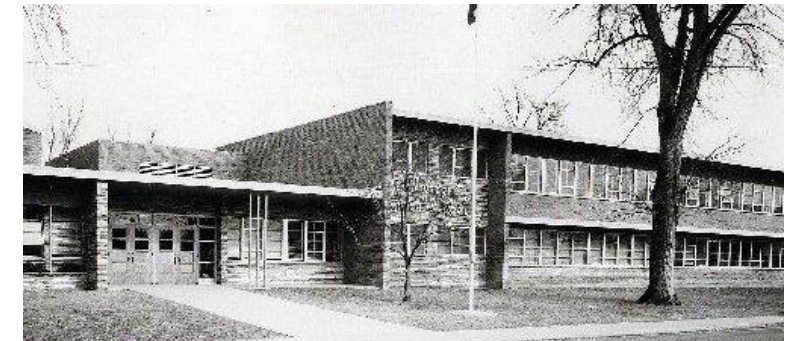
