
Flatirons Library Consortium

Congratulation to the Library!

We are celebrating our one-year anniversary of belonging to the Flatirons Library Consortium (FLC). This group includes the Boulder, Broomfield, Louisville, Longmont, Lafayette, and Loveland Public Libraries.

All of the libraries are separate organizations with separate funding and have formed a legal entity, enabling the sharing of almost all of the holdings of each library with each of the other member libraries.

A courier service delivers material every day to all six member libraries – greatly increasing the pool of available items to the Library's patrons. The number of items requested from other libraries in January was 6,853, an increase from last January of 54.6%.

Patrons learned ways to minimize the risk of identity theft and all about data breaches, online safety practices, email scams, password tips, phone scams, and more.



First Grade Field Trips

Starting in October of 2017 and ending in February of this year, the library hosted first graders from 19 Loveland elementary schools.

968 first graders went on a dinosaur hunt/tour of the children's area, were treated to a fun storytime and also received their very own library card and were able to check out a book.

Staff shared information with teachers, parents, and children about the phenomenal services and materials available to them at the Library.

Youth on Board

The City Council unanimously passed an ordinance in February allowing a youth member on the Library Board.

This commitment fits into the Library's objective of meeting the information needs of

patrons of all ages. It offers a powerful tool for the teenagers to engage in important community discussions.

Loveland is the FIRST public library in Colorado to have a designated spot for a youth on a Library board.

Rocky Mountain Raptors

Rocky Mountain Raptors presented a program on February 19 at the Library. There were 109 folks attending. They brought 3 owls including a barn owl, eastern screech owl, and a great horned owl. The crowd enjoyed seeing the birds and hearing details about each species.

The Rocky Mountain Raptor Program serves northern Colorado communities through rescue, rehabilitation, and release of injured birds of prey.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Series

In February, the Library presented the first of a three-program-series on Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. These programs focused on the Jim Crow laws, poverty, and the Vietnam War. The lectures and discussions are presented by Dr. George Stevens of Loveland's Martin Luther King Events Committee. The goal is to examine the issues of race through the lens of Dr. King. February's presentation, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Challenges to Jim Crow, looked at Dr. King's reliance on nonviolence and efforts to alert the media, creating government awareness.

WWI in America

On February 15, the Library, in partnership with Colorado Humanities, hosted a discussion of the book *Testament of Youth* by Vera Brittain. In 1914, Vera Brittain was twenty and, as war was declared, she was preparing to study at Oxford. Four years later, her life - and the lives of her whole generation - had changed in a way that was unimaginable in the tranquil pre-war era.

This was part of the series *Where Do We Go From Here? : America in the First World War*, presented by the Arvada Center for the Arts and Humanities, Colorado Humanities, and the Colorado World War I Centennial Commission.
