6   A meeting of the Loveland Historic Preservation Commission was held Monday, March 19, 2018 at 6:00  
7   P.M. in the Development Center at 410 East 5<sup>th</sup> Street, Loveland, CO. Historic Preservation Commissioners  
8   in attendance were Zach Askeland, Jim Cox, Isaac Lujan, Josh McCarn, Stacee Kersley, Paula Sutton and  
9   Laurie White. Council Liaison John Fogle and Nikki Garshelis of Development Services was also present.

11   **Guests:** Mike Perry and Sharon Danhauer of the Loveland Historical Society and Reyana Jones, Graduate  
12   CSU Student.

13   **CALL TO ORDER**

14   *Commission Chair Askeland called the meeting to order at 6:04 p.m.*

15   **APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA**

17   *Commissioner Cox made a motion to approve the agenda. Commissioner Kersley seconded the motion and  
18   it passed unanimously.*

25   **CITY COUNCIL UPDATE**

27   Councilor Fogle reported on the County building bidding process. He also talked about the Council trip to  
28   Washington D.C. for the National League of Cities Conference. He discussed the new cell towers that  
29   deploy 5G technology. He said the concern cities have is they are very obtrusive and look like  
30   refrigerators on a light pole.

33   *Nikki Garshelis reported on the Great Western Railway Depot, the 2019 Survey plan, the East 3<sup>rd</sup> Street  
34   request and the recent Boards & Commissions Event.*

35   **CONSIDERATION OF NEW BUSINESS**

36   **RECOGNITION FOR HAROLD DUNNING**

37  
38   *Mike Perry, President of the Loveland Historical Society gave a presentation and a handout on the  
39   accomplishments and importance of Harold Dunning. Dunning devoted more than 60 years to collecting,  
40   preserving and publicizing the history of Larimer County. He started the Pioneer Museum in 1938 in a  
41   converted garage located on the alley just west of the current museum building. He authored many articles,  
42   pamphlets, and books. *Over Hill and Vale* was his most well-known book. Mike reported about how  
43   Dunning's research and writings has inspired and educated the Loveland community and the region for  
44   45

47 years. Dunning's granddaughter, moved back to Loveland and the Loveland Historical Society would like to  
48 honor Dunning with some signage or plaque. There was a long discussion and ideas and the HPC agreed to  
49 discuss this further at their next meeting.

## 51 **LOVELAND HIGH SCHOOL PROJECT**

52 Reyana Jones, a CSU graduate student, reported that she is working on Loveland High School as her  
53 graduate research project. Reyana was a teacher at Bill Reed Middle School. She explained how she would  
54 be developing her thesis and was researching oral histories, poems, yearbooks, district log books,  
55 newspaper articles and many other resources. The Commissioners gave her some additional ideas and  
56 direction and expressed their gratitude that she was taking on this important project. The final report can  
57 be used to apply for a state and national register designation. Reyana also will be creating a one page  
58 informational handout, perhaps a timeline, to be distributed to guests at the 100 Year anniversary event  
59 on May 5<sup>th</sup>.

## STAFF UPDATE

**Great Western Railway Depot & Freight Building:** The property for the North Transit Center has been purchased by the City of Loveland. An architect has been contracted for the project. The architect is Ted Halsey, AIA LEED AP, from SEH in Denver. SEH is an engineering, architectural, environmental and planning company. A project meeting with the architect was held on April 11 with the architect and City Facilities staff. An update meeting will be scheduled in May with the Loveland Historical Society and HPC members once the architect has completed the analysis of the GWRD.



**Hertzinger Harter/El Centro Building:** A grant specialist has completed an application to the State Historical Fund on behalf of the City of Loveland and the property owner of 141 East 4<sup>th</sup> Street. The grant request is for \$187,000 with matching funds from the property owner to complete an exterior restoration of the building. The Hertzinger Harter/El Centro Building was built in 1877-78. The Herzinger & Harter Mercantile store opened in the spring of 1878, and in 1893 they sold the business to wholesale grocers, Beckfield and Galligan. By 1907 this business was known as the W.J. Galligan and Company, and they sold items such as buggies, wagons, and farm implements. Other tenants of the Herzinger & Harter Building included retail businesses including Swan and Hill Grocery (1908), Loveland National Bank (1908 – 1926) and Bengough Grocery (1921-1926). An extensive remodel was done in 1930 by renowned Colorado architect Robert K. Fuller. The building was originally constructed as a two-story, late 19th Century Victorian-era commercial structure, but the major renovation in 1930 transformed it into a Mission Revival style structure.

In August the grant decision will be known.

**339 East 3<sup>rd</sup> Street Request:** City staff was contacted by the owner of the property who is interested in a local historic landmark designation. She lives in Wisconsin and is unable to do the necessary research and application. She would like assistance from the HPC, if possible. Are there any HPC member who would like to volunteer for the task?

**Edwardian Vernacular\***  
built in 1897

\*Edwardian buildings are basically post-Victorian residences similar to the Queen Anne style in form and massing but lacking ornamentation. Sometimes called Princess Anne, these buildings feature multi-gabled roofs, asymmetrical massing, simple surfaces, and occasionally wrap-around porches, a short tower, and classical detailing.

**Common elements:**

1. multi-gabled roof
2. asymmetrical massing
3. simple surfaces
4. wrap-around porch
5. short tower

\*Vernacular: A style of architecture exemplifying the commonest techniques, decorative features, and materials of a particular historical period, region, or group of people.
