One of the points from the video that resonated with all the staff was just how important the library is to people experiencing homelessness. Doing something as simple as making eye contact, calling someone by their name and treating all our customers fairly and with respect can make a profound difference.

An Evening with a Storyteller

Storyteller and photographer David Fanning presented Tales of Adventure in the Galapagos Islands at the Library on May 15.

He was joined by science teacher Carol Seemueller in describing flamingos and penguins in the wild, as well as giant tortoises, blue-footed boobies, ferocious looking but gentle marine iguanas, sea turtles and sharks, and roaring sea lions.

Children's Activities

The children coming to the Library in May participated in the Kids Crochet Club and had fun with Brickmasters: Build with Legos.

They worked with Robots and came to the Loteria Family Event (a wonderful game of Bingo, Mexican-style.) And, of course, there were many storytimes, including Lapsit for 0-36 months, Toddlers (ages 2-3 years), Preschool (4-7 years), Family (age 3-7) and bilingual storytime.

There was Waggin' Tales (a chance to read to a licensed therapy dog) and Buddy Reading with volunteers to help. Music and Movement got them dancing and singing and Club 354 introduced them to science.

Teens Activities

The Library teens were busy making soda bottle greenhouses and mini light sabers. They made self-care kits and celebrated National Wildflower Week by planting wildflowers.

They also made Karakuri creations, an origami project taken up a notch to create a moving paper model.

The Teen Advisory Board sponsored an End of School party and the teen staff held a Volunteer Summer Reading Orientation, helping kids find a great way to spend their summer by volunteering at the Library.

Last of the Doughboys

On May 17, the Library held a program on *The Last of the Doughboys* by Richard Rubin. In 2003, 85 years after the end of World War I, Richard Rubin found dozens of veterans, aged 101 to 113, from Cape Cod to Carson City, who had served in World War I.

They shared with him their stories of America's Great War. This is part of the series *Where Do We Go From Here?*: America in the First World War Presented by the Arvada Center for the Arts and Humanities, Colorado Humanities, and the Colorado World War I Centennial Commission.
