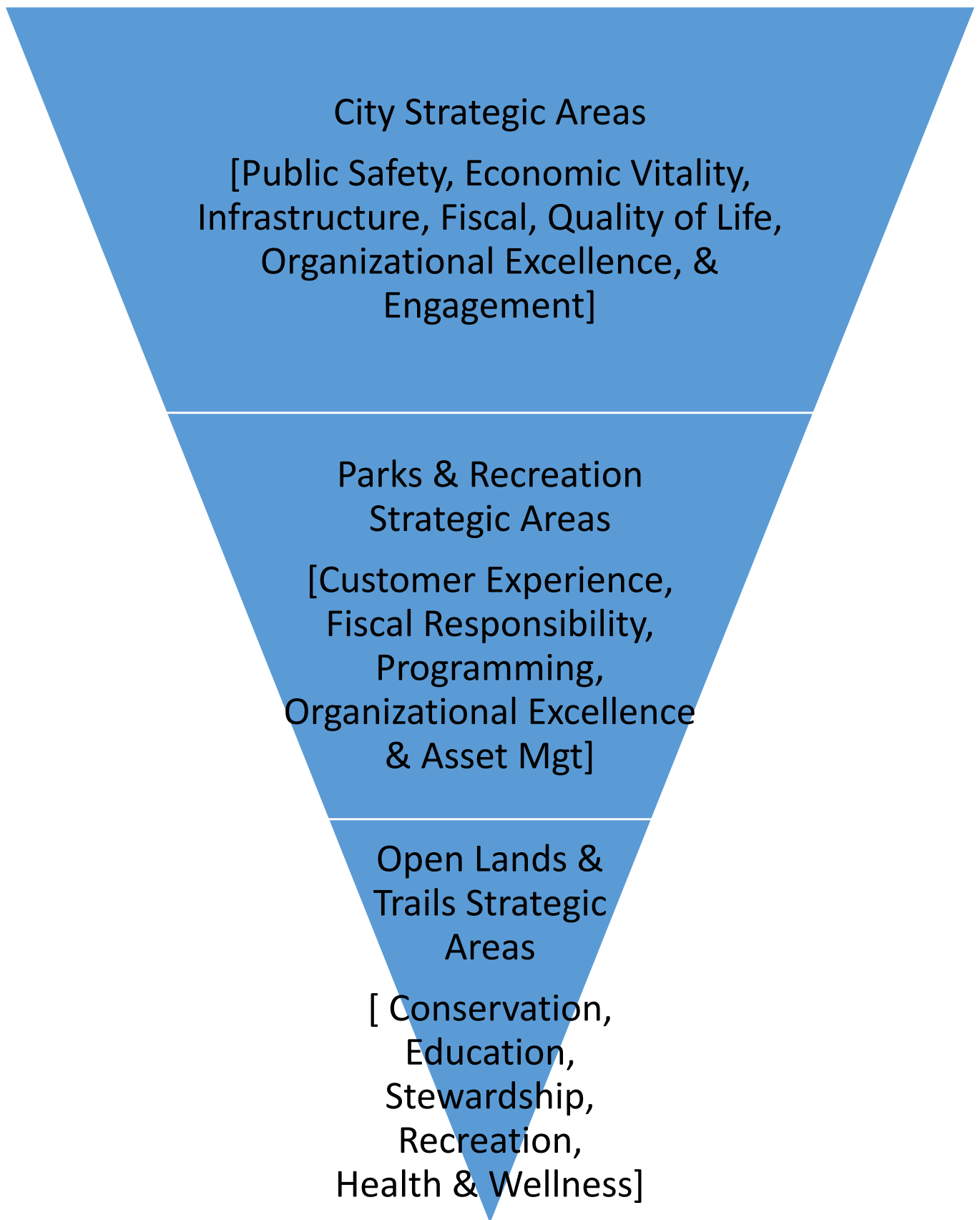
Parks & Recreation Department Mission:
