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Introduction

Purpose

The primary purpose for conducting the Loveland Police Department's (LPD) 2020 combined Citizen Satisfaction and Public Safety Survey was to determine City of Loveland citizen perceptions of the overall quality of police services in the community as well as assess their perception of public safety, crime levels, and fear of crime in Loveland.

Perceptions about methods or programs for dealing with or improving both services as well as public safety were also assessed to determine general community opinions and desires concerning various methods/programs for dealing with crime as well as the quality of services the Loveland Police Department provides.

Citizen's perceptions of the quality and importance of police services as well as their perceptions of crime and fear of crime in Loveland should serve to inform the public as well as the City Council and police administrators who make management decisions regarding priorities, budgets, staffing and general or operational planning. The survey provides an opportunity for the Loveland Police Department to identify areas in which it is performing well along with areas needing improvement. The Department values communication, organizational excellence, the people we serve, and citizen input to assure an informed and balanced perspective in delivery of police services. Where possible, information obtained from this survey may be compared to responses from the 2017 citizen satisfaction survey and the 2018 public safety survey. These comparisons help to identify trends and gauge progress toward meeting the needs of Loveland's citizens for police services.

Methodology

The Loveland Police Department's 2020 combined satisfaction and public safety survey utilized an online survey format. Utilizing the city's Public Information Office, marketing efforts were made using a variety of platforms to include: Open City Hall, Nextdoor, and Constant Contact as well as an article in the Reporter-Herald. These platforms targeted city of Loveland residents. The estimated combined reach of these efforts was at least approximately 37,000 citizens. The survey was open for response from July 21st to August 22nd, 2020.

The goal for the survey was to obtain enough responses to support a 95% confidence level with a $\pm 5\%$ error window for statistical accuracy. Based on Loveland's estimated 2020 population of 81,208¹, to meet this standard the survey needed to be "sent" to at least 3820 people (assuming a 10% response rate) and a minimum of 382 survey responses were needed. Given the reach of the marketing effort mentioned above, the 3820 amount was more than adequately met. Statistical formulas/survey tools² were used to calculate these numbers.

The number of valid responses recorded for the survey totaled 1540. This surpassed the 382 minimum that were needed. Responses from the surveys were compiled for analysis with no attempt made to identify respondents from the responses made on the surveys. The identity of those Loveland citizens who may have chosen to make themselves known will remain anonymous.

These results are statistically reliable within a 5% confidence interval at the 95% confidence level. What this means is, if the same survey was repeated 100 times, that 95 times out of 100, the subsequent results would be within $\pm 5\%$ of the initial survey results.

Another way to look at this is as follows: If 62% of the survey respondents "feel comfortable contacting the Loveland Police Department to make suggestions", then 95 out of every 100 times one would expect the percentage of the entire population that "feel comfortable contacting the Loveland Police Department to make suggestions" will fall between 57% and 67% ($62\% \pm 5\%$).

Comparisons to 2017 Satisfaction Survey and 2018 Public Safety Survey

Since accreditation requirements for our survey frequency changed to every other year, these two surveys were combined into one survey. Previously they were done individually in separate years on an every three year schedule. 2020 is the first year of doing a combined survey. Various results from this survey will be compared to the results from the previous 2017 satisfaction survey and the 2018 public safety. The information obtained from this survey may help evaluate citizen concerns and assist the Loveland Police Department in development of specific strategies for particular patrol districts in the City. The survey items/questions (dependent variables) considered in the analysis included:

1. Respondent satisfaction with several categories of police services.
2. Respondent satisfaction with the attitude, behavior and competence of police personnel with whom they came into contact.
3. Respondent satisfaction with the quality of service received relative to their expectations.
4. Respondent satisfaction with general police services provided in their neighborhood or in the City as a whole.
5. Agreement or disagreement with several statements regarding police services in Loveland.
6. The relative importance of various Loveland Police Department programs.
7. Respondent perception of crime in Loveland and their fear of crime
8. Respondent perception of public/personal safety
9. Respondent assessment of various programs/strategies for fighting crime and improving public safety

Executive summary

Key take-a ways and significant findings of this survey and some comparisons with previous surveys include:

- 98.4% of respondents agreed that improving public safety and the quality of life in Loveland are responsibilities of both citizens and police (up from 90.4% in 2017).
- 93.5% of respondents are satisfied with the general level of police services in the entire City (up from 83.3% in 2017).
- 92.9% of respondents are satisfied with the general level of police services in their neighborhood (up from 79.9% in 2017).
- 86.8% of respondents were satisfied with the Police Department's quick response to emergency situations (up from 78.1% in 2017). Also a big increase in satisfaction with the Police Department's provision of crime control in their neighborhood at 83.6% compared to 68.2% in 2017.
- Respondents rated Loveland Police officers higher in the categories of Professional, Courteous, Knowledgeable, Trustworthy, Hardworking, Easy to Approach, and being Fair than they did in the 2017 survey.
- 86.8% of respondents indicated they always or usually felt safe and secure in their Loveland neighborhood. This is up from 78.5% in the 2018 survey.
- Only 26.4% of respondents indicated that they were very or somewhat fearful about crime in Loveland. This is down from 48.3% in the 2018 survey.
- Road rage was again the top activity/crime that respondents indicated they were very concerned or moderately concerned about at 50.4%. This is down from 58.1% in the 2018 survey.
- Police visibility once again was ranked by respondents as the most effective method for improving public safety with an average rank of 2.8. Respondents were asked to rank 15 items from 1 to 15 with 1 being the most effective and 15 being the least. Just over half of the responses on this question gave it a #1 ranking. This was increase from the 2018 survey where police visibility had an average rank of 3.3.

The percentage of respondents who gave a rating of Very Important or Important regarding various police department programs in relation to the community and the percent change from the 2017 survey are as follows:


Residency demographics – Years Lived in Loveland






Residency demographics – Police District of Residency




Age demographic:

Respondents were assigned to one of seven age groups. The 55-66 age group had the largest percentage at **25.8%**.



Gender demographics



Respondents who have children ages 5-18 who attend schools in Loveland





Question 8 - Satisfaction with Loveland PD services by category

Quick response to emergency situation

n = 1234 A total of 86.8% of respondents indicated they were very satisfied or moderately satisfied with the Loveland Police Department's quick response to emergency situations (up from 78.1% in the 2017 survey). 9.0% were neutral in their response and 4.2% responded that they were moderately or very dissatisfied.

Crime control in neighborhood

n = 1461 A total of 83.6% of respondents indicated they were very or moderately satisfied with crime control in their neighborhood (up from 68.2% in the 2017 survey). 10.3% were neutral and 4.2% were moderately or very dissatisfied.

Help with nuisance issues

n = 1211 72.2% of respondents indicated they were very or moderately satisfied in this category (up from 64.1% in the 2017 survey). 14.7% were neutral in their response and 13.1% were moderately or very dissatisfied.

Providing crime prevention advice

n = 1157 70.0% of respondents were very or moderately satisfied (up from 62.8% in the 2017 survey) while 23.9% were neutral and 6.1% were moderately or very dissatisfied.

Understanding community concerns

n = 1348 73.4% of respondents were moderately or very satisfied in regards to how they felt about the Loveland Police Department's understanding of community concerns (up from 65% in the 2017 survey). 16.1% were neutral and 10.5% were moderately or very dissatisfied.


Providing fair and equal treatment to all

n = 1378 76.7% of respondents indicated they were moderately or very satisfied (up from 69.6% in the 2017 survey). 12.5% were neutral in their response and 10.8% were moderately or very dissatisfied.

Handling citizen's complaints

n = 1261 75.0% of respondents were very or moderately satisfied (up from 63.4% in the 2017 survey) while 14.9% were neutral and 10.1% were moderately or very dissatisfied.

Question 9 – Formal Contact with the Department in last 36 months

Respondents that answered: n = 974

63.2% (974 of the 1,540) of respondents indicated that they or a member of their immediate family had formal contact with a member of the Loveland Police Department during the prior 36 months. This enhances the responses to questions 10a and 10b below, which deals with those who did have formal contact and how they rated their experience in terms of attitude and competence with any of the various Loveland Police Department work groups with which they had formal contact. It should be noted, respondents were asked to rate only those work groups that they had formal contact with, so individual work group response totals will be less than the 974.

Questions 10 and 11 - Ratings of experience during formal contact with LPD employee groups (Q10: Attitude, Q11: Competence)

All employee groups had higher combined ratings of Excellent, Very Good or Good as compared to the 2014 survey for both attitude and competence. (Question 10 and 11 graph on page 18).













There were 1005 responses to the open-ended survey question "What do you feel the Loveland Police Department does or is doing especially well?".

Good visibility and positive traffic related comments were amongst the most frequent mentioned items in the comments. The professionalism of the officers was also often mentioned.

Q31 - What suggestions do you have for areas you feel the Loveland Police Department could do better?

There were 962 responses to the open-ended survey question "What do you feel the Loveland Police Department does or is doing especially well?".

Comments about needing/improving visibility as well as traffic related improvements were some of the most frequently mentioned subjects in these comments. Additionally, the transient issues were also frequently mentioned as a subject. Also often mentioned in these comments were issues regarding police bias/use of force/cultural awareness (or the perceived lack thereof), racism, and other items related to social justice issues.

I am leaving Loveland because I have nightmares and wake up terrified that I'll be the victim of a hate crime and I can't live like that. I fear that if I call the Loveland Police because I'm being assaulted that I'll be the one to go to jail if it is a White person who attacks me. I've told all my friends who were considering moving to stay far far away from Loveland. I also have an employee whose family suffered after a racially motivated attack a few years ago in downtown Loveland and sadly it was her husband who was charged after several men started threatening them. The men have never been arrested, only the minority victim's husband. It's disgraceful. Loveland is so beautiful and I've never loved in a more beautiful place but that's not enough. Racism should not be overlooked here, it's really really really bad. Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback.

I believe the mental health facility that is being built is a critical piece for the quality and care of Loveland citizens who are undergoing a mental health crisis. I believe Loveland PD needs to be trained regularly on how to respond to someone who is experiencing mental health crisis in order to help calm them down. I have heard that the Loveland PD is very white and operates under a "good boy" mentality. I have heard of a lot of corruption. Additionally, I have not been impressed with how the Loveland PD handles neighborhood issues. I contacted them because I heard some violent things happening in an area near my house, and the Loveland Police Officer was agitated with me and said, "I was just there this morning, are you sure it just happened?" He was annoyed that he "had to go back" to the same house. Later that week, the woman who was there tried to take her own life in a very violent way. Obviously, the police do not know how to address someone who is experiencing a mental health crisis. It would be unsafe for me to respond without any authority, but I also do not feel like the police know what to do - at all. Maybe I should respond and not call the police? Is that really what you want?

Taking pictures through the neighbor's windows, and holding their cell phone on video record each time the neighbor goes outside. 5. Lying to the police when their car, truck and children's toys are in the street that the neighbor has hit them with their car - when it couldn't of happened since their property was already damaged by their own negligence. 6. Leaving abusive literature and pictures in the neighbor's mailbox and front porch. 7. Regular drug package drop offs and pickups occurring at this address or down the street (which is only .2 miles from Lauraine Edmonson Elementary School. 8. The neighbor has called the police in the past about these situations, but because of her FEAR of retaliation or police corruption (she feels the police officers must be in on the drug money payoffs because they never take action and it's been 3 years) 9. This neighbor feels she HAS to move out of LOVELAND because she doesn't trust the police to keep her SAFE. I myself drove this neighbor at 4832 N. Sheridan Ave to a job interview in Denver at 10 am, and returned at 7:35pm and observed the wife taking pictures of my car and us leaving and coming back. Afterwards I wondered why they did this. Except it reminded me of a time when our rental property in Centerra 10 years ago was being rented by a drug lord (sister) and her brother who worked at the local Jiffy Lube. We found out when they couldn't make rent for several months, begging us that they would eventually move out, and finally making an agreed on date to move out. They didn't realize that we took them at their word and quietly scheduled a moving truck to come to the address and help them move, when we arrived with fresh pizza and soda and a couple of friends. When the brother answered the door he said he wasn't ready to move and the sister came down the stairs and said YOU CAN'T EVICT US, we'll call the police! My husband said great go ahead, and handed the brother his cell phone telling him (you know this house has been under surveillance for the past month and in fact there is a black and white police car watching the house if you just look down the alley and he showed the renter) - who then said NO, NO we don't want any police, we'll move. Then after he signed the approval form for the movers who started packing up all their stuff and loading it into the large truck they had parked behind the garage. The closet was filled with lots of what I would assume was stolen property (Computers, electronics, etc.) that was all loaded in the moving van because we as citizens and landlords didn't want trouble, but when the couches were removed there were several personal ID's and Credit Cards that were left behind that were obviously stolen ids since they didn't match their names that they left behind so we turned these into the police department. Everything went well for us and we assume the police got to follow them to their new location. I trust this issue can also be creatively resolved and peace can be restored - one neighborhood at a time. Well - you asked for suggestions - not complaints, so here are my best recommendations. Please put this address on NOTICE and watch the house from afar 24/7 (they watch the streets and sit tight if they feel like they are being observed). Trim up the trees that are hiding the corner at Sheridan Ave and 48th street and 48th street and Grant Ave, so they can't hide and make sure the street signs are visible at each intersection. Place a motion activated video camera at the house across the street at 4832 N. Sheridan Ave facing West to them so you can have a silent witness as to what goes on.
