Loveland Recreation Trail earns Starburst Award

On Sept. 10, the City of Loveland hosted the Loveland Trails Day Celebration to receive the Starburst Award from Lottery officials in front of staff, elected officials, community partners and Loveland residents with whom the trail was designed to benefit.

The Starburst award recognizes excellence in the use of Lottery funds for community and conservation projects and is awarded based on the creativity of the project, and economic and social impact to the community. Lottery proceeds are distributed statewide through several grants, including the Conservation Trust Fund.

Over the years, the City of Loveland has received \$19 million in lottery disbursements with \$15 million used for building and maintaining trails. The \$850,000 contributed from the Conservation Trust Fund last year was used for the half-mile stretch of paved trail near Sunset Vista Natural Area, including a railroad crossing and bridge over the site's wetlands.

"City of Loveland residents have demonstrated that they enjoy getting outdoors for health and wellness opportunities, and to enjoy our beautiful city," said Marilyn Hilgenberg, the City's Open Lands & Trails Division manager. "The Loveland Recreation Trail is about connecting the community and helping our residents achieve their wellness goals. This award is a perfect opportunity to recognize how Loveland is putting Colorado lottery dollars to use in our own backyard."

The recreation trail loop project was more than three decades in the making and began in the 1990s with the construction of the Big Thompson River Trail.

Hilgenberg credits the entire open lands and planning team for their dedication to bringing the project

to life.

"We truly have a group of talented, passionate and experienced employees working hard to help our community connect through trails and open space," said Hilgenberg.

Loveland 2022 National Community Survey results available

This summer, the City conducted its first community-wide survey since 2018. The City is now using The National Community Survey (NCS) conducted by National Research Center/Polco. The survey was conducted in two parts: the Random Sample Survey sent to 4,000 randomly selected households with 680 people (18%) responding; and the Open Participation Survey available to all Loveland residents was open from June 29 - July 13, 2022 online and in-person. 1,315 Lovelanders responded.

The following key takeaways were identified by our survey partner, The National Research Center/Polco.

- 1. Community members appreciate the local services provided by Loveland and have identified growth opportunities for governance.
- 2. Loveland residents praise their overall quality of life, though some aspects of equity and inclusion indicate an opportunity for growth.
- 3. The economy is a priority for Loveland, and residents show concern about general affordability and their own economic outlook.
- 4. City parks and the natural environment are community assets.

Loveland's internet, Pulse, launches ACP supplement to expand access for underserved

ulse's 100% fiber-optic internet, voice, and television network is being installed to serve Lovelanders now and for generations to come. With this utility in place, our residents will be guaranteed to have access to high-quality internet that will stand up to the data demands of the future.

To increase access to high-quality connectivity today, Pulse has launched an Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) supplemental expansion. The ACP is a federal program to help the underserved stay connected with up to \$30 per month of assistance. Pulse has pledged an additional \$14.95 per month for ACP-qualifying households.

Residents in Pulse-serviceable areas that qualify for ACP will now receive a total of \$44.95 per month in connectivity assistance. With this amount, customers using the Starter package will have an end-bill of \$0 per month for their internet

Dear Customer,

As an added convenience, we will soon begin collecting extra bags of trash placed outside of your cart without need of Trash Stamps.

Effective January 2, 2023, you will have the option of setting up to five 32-gallon/50-pound or smaller bags of trash next to your cart for collection. A fee of \$3.50 per bag will then be automatically assessed to your next utility bill. Our drivers will use an onboard computer and camera system to ensure accurate charges and documentation. No additional customer action is required to participate.

We will continue honoring Trash Stamps after January 2, 2023. However, these stamps will no longer be available for purchase at local grocery stores, once existing supplies run out.

Reminder, the trash cart must have the lid closed, bags need to be set on the ground next to the cart. If items cannot be placed in a trash bag, please contact Solid Waste for special pickup.

"NEVERMORE"

Beware of drain nightmares and scary repair costs...

Don't find yourself in the dark. Keep your eyes peeled for fats, oils and grease (AKA F.O.G.) and other monsters that cause plumbing woes for the pipes in your home and your community.



F.O.G. emanates from meats, butters and sauces whether you prepare the food or purchase it readymade. Don't believe the lore that using hot water or soap will clear up your F.O.G. problems. The truth is that as soon as F.O.G. hits cooler underground pipes, it sticks and causes buildup that forms blockages. The best way to fight F.O.G. is to follow these tips:

- Scrape all food waste into a lined garbage can.
- After it has cooled and solidified, place waste oil and grease from pots and pans into a suitable container and dispose of it in the trash.
- Use a strainer in the sink to capture solids rather than relying on a garbage disposal. Disposals require lots of water and misuse can cause smelly backups.
- Use paper towels to wipe small amounts of leftover oil and grease from pots, pans and utensils.
- Recycle cooking oil (i.e. from fryers) at the Loveland Recycling Center.


Packaging that markets anything other than toilet paper as "flushable" gives us goosebumps. We are terrified by how customers are led astray with this misleading information. Just because something "can" be flushed does not mean it should be flushed. In fact, sanitary wipes are one of the common causes of clogs that will haunt your pipes! Flushing bandages, cotton swabs, dental floss, diapers, hair, feminine hygiene products, wrappers and packaging should also be avoided.





Not only can flushing unwanted items cause damage to pipes, it can also damage the environment. The Water Reclamation Facility recycles wastewater from our homes and community and returns it to the Big Thompson River. While the water purification process is extensive, contaminants like medications or hazardous materials complicate the process and damage the system. Flushed pharmaceuticals have also been shown to harm fish and aquatic life.

Dispose of hazardous waste at the Loveland Recycling Center and return unused medications to an approved drug take-back drop-off site. The next National Prescription Drug Take Back Day is October 29, 2022. Law enforcement often hosts additional collection sites that day to encourage safe disposal.

NEXT PHASE OF ELECTRIC METERS COMING TO LOVELAND RESIDENTS

It's never been more important for utility providers to maintain efficiency, functionality and safety on the grid. Utilities throughout the country have been using Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) for decades to enhance efficiency, improve billing accuracy and provide customers access to more information and control over their utility bill.

Loveland Water and Power (LWP) launched an AMI solution citywide after carefully planning and testing this technology since 2014. Advanced metering infrastructure is a system of meters, communications networks and software that provides wireless delivery of meter information and service alerts directly to LWP. AMI technology automatically collects consumption data from electric and water meters and transfers the data over a secure network to a central database. The collected data is used for billing, analyzing usage trends and providing customers with advanced outage and leak notifications.

Electric and water utilities like LWP become more efficient and responsive when they upgrade to advanced metering infrastructure. AMI meters provide real-time data on utility consumption for more efficient billing. The meters also identify issues before they become costly problems because they reduce diagnostic and response time by immediately notifying LWP crews about leaks or other issues. AMI can also verify power outages and perform remote-service disconnects and reconnects.

The new technology does not negatively affect health or privacy. In fact, overall health will be improved and privacy enhanced by replacing vehicles and manual visits to homes with environmentally clean radio communication. The wireless portions of the system operate according to Federal Communications Commission rules and do not interfere with other radio frequencies in the area.

AMI metering saves customers money by providing detailed consumption information on electricity and water. AMI can report leaks or service issues to the customer and utility automatically.

All of the data gathered by advanced metering infrastructures are made available in real time resulting in improved operations and better customer experience. It's our goal to continually improve operational efficiencies and provide customers the service and reliability they need. AMI is a next step in advancing both of those initiatives.
