# Item 5.1: 2024 Levels of Service Update for Water and Wastewater Utilities - Michelle Erickson

Our Levels of Service (LOS) targets are the minimum acceptable levels that water and wastewater should strive to maintain. When we initially worked on setting our LOS, we took into consideration input from LUC, internal staff, customer expectations, regulatory requirements, actual performance, and the physical capabilities and limits of our current assets. Please see the attached presentation slides to view the results of our 2024 LOS compared to historical records back to 2009.

# Discussion:

**Bill Szmyd** wanted to know if we had any information tracking back to the year 2000 since he thought that was a historically dry year. **Chad Birgenheier** addressed historical water restrictions in the city.

**Councilor Olsen** wanted to know what Levels of Service report was used for. **Michelle Erickson** noted that this report is used to help identify good uses of budget or areas for improvement.

**Don Cook** wanted to know how we set the levels of service that we are trying to achieve. **Michelle Erickson** stated that around 11 years ago for the first report we hired a consultant to help us create

the report with input from staff and LUC. She also noted that the levels of service are the minimum requirements.

Christopher Say wanted to commend water staff because a few years ago we had yearly issues with algae blooms in the late summer and early fall and he no longer notices algae taste and odor issues. Great job!

# Item 5.2: HIP Streets - 4th Street Waterline Replacement - Donald Cecil

The Heart Improvement Project (HIP Streets) will consist of the revitalization of 4th Street in downtown Loveland, across five (5) blocks from Washington Avenue to Garfield Avenue. As part of the overall infrastructure program, the water division will replace the existing 10" cast iron water main with new 12" PVC for the length of the project.

**Recommendation:** Staff item only. No action required.

# Discussion:

Gary Hausman wanted to know how the fire suppression system grants work. Donald Cecil noted that the Downtown Development Authority (DDA) helps arrange the grants and then customers sign contracts with the DDA directly.

Randy Williams asked for verification that two water lines will be going into each building downtown. Donald Cecil confirmed that one water line is residential, and the other is commercial.

Bill Szmyd wanted to know who would deal with the parking situation downtown. Donald Cecil conveyed that the city is working with the DDA to get information out on alternatives for parking. There are also some city staff parking lots that will be turned over after hours to help accommodate evening parking. He also noted that once this project is complete there will be a net gain of 13 or 14 parking spaces downtown at the end of the project.

Bill Szmyd had questions about the 'dry utilities' like Comcast or Pulse. Donald noted that the dry utilities are in the allies downtown so they are behind the buildings and not in the street area where construction will interfere.

Gary Hausman inquired about lighting improvements downtown as part of this project. Donald Cecil noted that there will be some new transformers and there will be some event lighting installed. Adam Bromley noted that they are looking to underground some of the electrical equipment in the downtown area on the south side of 4th.

Gary Hausman also wanted to know if cameras would be included as part of this project scope. Donald Cecil noted that the extra conduit planned as part of the project could help the capabilities for cameras in the future but camera installation is not part of the project.

Dan Herlihey had specific questions regarding the right of way across the BNSF crossing. The plan is to have a trenchless design for that area.

# Item 7.1: Director's Report - Sharon Israel

- Sharon Israel and Adam Bromley attended the Larimer County Planning Commission meeting on Wednesday, February 12, 2025, where the commission discussed and approved the Platte River Power Authority Rawhide 1041 Permit 24-ZONE3715. The Larimer County Board of County Commissions will consider approval of the permit at their March 10, 2025, meeting.
