

Pulse Fiber Internet lights up TSD

Thompson School District (TSD), which serves approximately 15,000 students, now has Pulse Fiber as its internet service provider. The transition to the City of Loveland's municipal broadband utility reduces monthly costs while increasing internet reliability and flexibility.

By partnering with Pulse, the district has also provided additional connections to support ESports and cyber security networks with some of the Loveland-area schools.

Pulse began serving Big Thompson Elementary School in 2020, giving the school the necessary networking infrastructure to support a curriculum heavily reliant on online resources.

In 2024, Pulse began the fiber buildout to reach the remaining schools within TSD's territory. "Pulse's engineering team bent over backward to make sure we had a smooth transition, working through the night multiple times to ensure no staff or students would experience any outages while we made the change," said J.D. Walker, senior network engineer with TSD.

With this infrastructure update, TSD will continue to support its 1:1 student device program and digital learning opportunities, ensuring that all students have reliable access to online resources during the school day.

Brieana Reed-Harmel, broadband manager for Pulse, said, "There is a certain pride that City of Loveland employees, like those of us at Pulse, have in making sure that the schools and students of our community are well taken care of and that they have opportunities equal to, or better than, any other district in the country."

Four quick flood safety tips

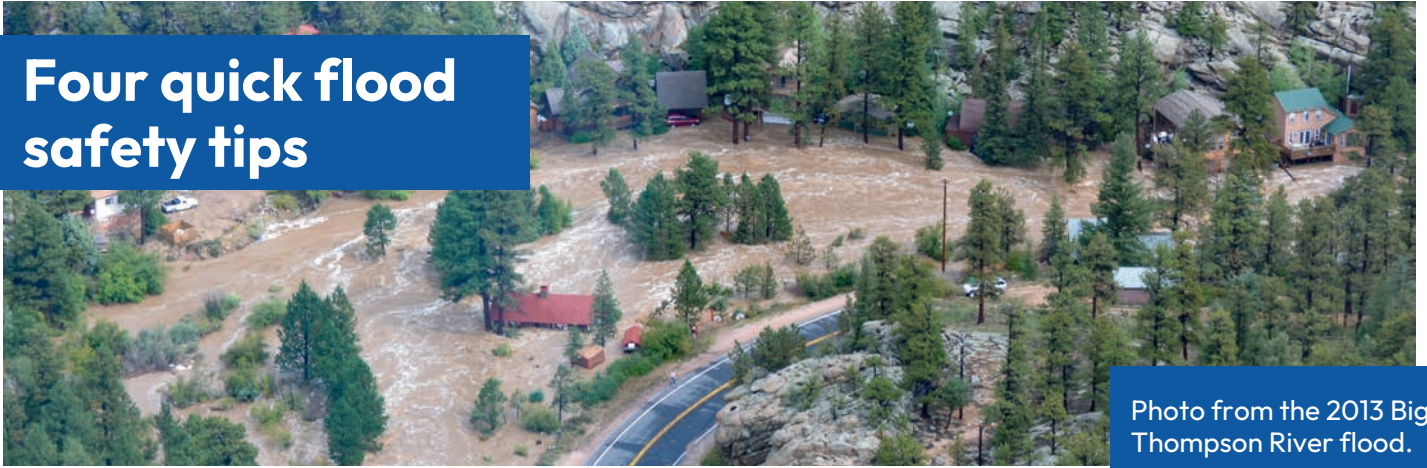


Photo from the 2013 Big Thompson River flood.

Colorado residents should be aware that flooding is a common hazard, particularly during the summer months. A flood can happen over a period of time, while flash flooding, can happen in an instant. Here is what you need to know about floods to keep you and your family safe.

1

Be aware

Check your surroundings and be aware of areas where flooding typically occurs.

2

Do not drive into water

Do not drive or walk into flooded areas. It only takes six inches of water to knock you off your feet.

3

Stay informed

Monitor local radar, news, weather radio, internet or social media for updates.

4

Emergency kit

Pack an emergency kit with essential medications, documents and non-perishable food.

Watch versus warning: know your alerts



Flash Flood Watch

Flash flooding is possible. Be prepared to move to higher ground and tune in to your radio or television for information.



Flash Flood Warning

A flash flood is occurring; seek higher ground on foot immediately.



Flood Watch

The possibility of flooding is present, but its probability is relatively low. Monitor communication channels for information.



Flood Warning

Flooding is occurring or will occur soon. Indications show that water levels will exceed the alert level within 24 hours. If advised to evacuate, do so immediately.

If we can't reach you, we can't alert you. Loveland's emergency notification system is called NoCo Alert. Subscribers can provide multiple addresses, including home, school, and work, and they can set language preferences. The museum exhibit will run June 13-Oct. 18, 2025

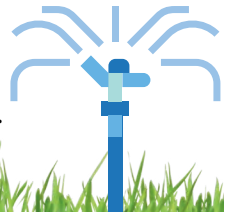

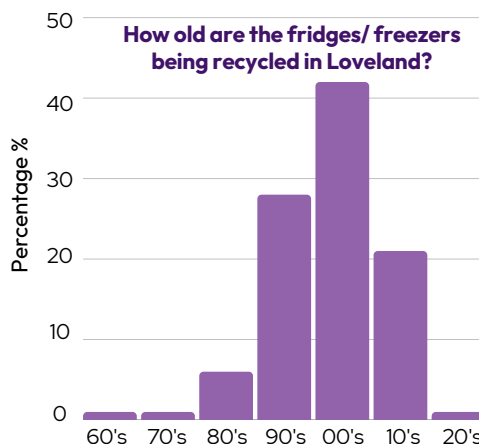
